Tar Wars Smoking Prevention Program

Janney Elementary School students recently participated in the Tar Wars educational session. The tobacco-free program is designed for fourth and fifth graders and teaches kids about the short and long term consequences of tobacco use, the cost of tobacco products, and the advertising techniques used by the tobacco industry to market their products to youth. Nurse Peaks prompted the students to practice refusal skills in case they are ever approached to try tobacco products or other unsafe substances or behaviors.

Janney students created posters that communicate a clear and positive message to remain tobacco free with Nurse Peaks facilitating a poster competition. The fifth grade students and six Janney staff members voted for the top three posters. The winners, Zoe Thompson, Emily Scarrow and Virginia Suardi were recognized and awarded gift cards. The three winning posters and five additional posters were submitted for the DC Tar Wars Chapter 2014 Poster competition.

Sickle Cell Disease

Sickle cell disease is an inherited condition that affects the ability of red blood cells to travel throughout the body and shortens the lifespan of the cells. Red blood cells are generally smooth and round so they will readily move through the body's small blood vessels. However the red blood cells of those with sickle cell disease often assume a rigid "C" or sickle shape that causes them to stick in the small blood vessels where they block the normal flow of blood and starve vital tissues and organs of life giving oxygen. A minor genetic change produces a form of hemoglobin, the protein in red blood cells that picks up oxygen in the lungs and delivers it to the tissues, which leads to shape changes and shortened survival of red blood cells.

People with sickle cell disease can experience life-threatening infections, extreme fatigue and pain so debilitating that they must go to an emergency room for pain relief with powerful prescription narcotics. Forty years ago, almost 15 percent of children born with the disease died before the age of 2 and many more died in their teens. Today, however the life expectancy for people with sickle cell disease has dramatically increased.



featured in Carolyn Jones 2012 book *The American Nurse*. Four other nurses from Children's National were featured in the book and CNMC is the only freestanding pediatric hospital whose nurses were featured.

Although only 5 of the nurses featured in the book were subsequently filmed for an in-depth interview for the documentary, much to Crowder's surprise, she was one of a handful of nurses who was shown as part of the introduction to the film.
