Research Report

What About the Girls?

In a new article, "[What About the Girls? Sex-Based Differences in Autistic Traits and Adaptive Skills](#)", featured in the Journal of Autism and Developmental Disorders, CASD researchers, led by Dr. Allison Ratto, and collaborators at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, the Autistic Self Advocacy Network, Virginia Tech University, and the National Institute of Mental Health, reported that there is growing evidence of a camouflaging effect among females with autism spectrum disorder (ASD), particularly among those without



intellectual disability, which may affect performance Allison Ratto, PhD on gold-standard diagnostic measures.

The findings show that although females and males were rated similarly on gold-standard diagnostic measures overall, females with higher cognitive ability were less likely to meet criteria for ASD on one measure. Parents also rated females as having more autistic traits and weaker adaptive skills than males. Therefore, the findings suggest that some autistic females may be missed by current diagnostic procedures. This research and prior work published by CASD, ("[Sex Differences in Parent-reported Executive Functioning and Adaptive Behavior in Children and Young Adults with Autism Spectrum Disorder](#)"), have contributed to new work in which CASD researchers will be working as part of a multi-site team, funded by the NIH Autism Centers of Excellence (ACE) Program, to better understand the presentation of autism in females and in gender-variant individuals and to improve our diagnostic procedures for these groups.
