RDoC Project Enters Year Four



The Research Domain Criteria Initiative (or RDoC) project is entering its fourth year this fall! The project entitled, "Executive Function Across Pediatric Psychiatric Disorders," is a collaboration between CASD and Georgetown University's Developmental

Cognitive Neuroscience Laboratory (DCNL), and is funded by the National Institute of Mental Health. The project is studying executive function skills, such as attention, memory, and learning, using magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) across different diagnoses. 142 children have already participated in the study over the last three years of the project.

The RDoC research team would like to thank you for your interest and participation, as none of this would be possible without the participation of families. Our recruitment efforts are currently being focused on participants ages 8-13 with non-ASD or Attention Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder related executive functioning challenges, such as learning disabilities, anxiety, mood disorder, conduct disorders, depression and bipolar disorders.




